PREPARING FOR YOUR FUTURE AFTER HIGH SCHOOL



Your plans for the future are important! There are many post-secondary options open to high school graduates. Some serious thinking and planning will make your post-high school transition easier. It is important to organize your thoughts and ideas about your goals and what you need to do to achieve them.



POST-SECONDARY EDUCATION

- 4-year Colleges and Universities
- 2-year Colleges/Community Colleges
- Vocational/Technical/Trade/Career Schools

All high school graduates are eligible to attend the College of Southern Maryland (CSM). Students who attend CSM can earn a 2-year degree (Associate Degree). CSM also has many partnerships with 4-year colleges, which enables students to have the opportunity to complete their first two years at CSM and then transfer to a 4-year school to complete their last two years of a 4-year degree. Students may attend CSM and then transfer to a 4-year college in Maryland or an out-of-state college. CSM is an option for many graduates who would like to work full-time or part-time and also take college level courses. Freshmen: (**Freshmen year DOES count!**)

- Be sure you are doing your best to earn the highest grades...**freshman year counts toward your cumulative GPA** which will be used for college admissions and job applications!
- Please take advantage of the resources in the College & Career Center and on the College & Career Center webpage of the St. Charles High School website to help you start thinking about the future.
- Use the **XELLO** link on the Clever App in your Office 365 account, Study Island, and other resources for exploring your career options.
- Get involved in clubs and extracurricular activities. Do volunteer work/community service! All of these things are important and can be added to your resume!!!



Sophomore:

- Focus on your academics. Ask for help if you need it. Don't fall behind in your classes. Do extra credit whenever it is offered. Use tutoring services for help, such as the Activity Period, www.khanacademy.org, or the **FEV Tutor app** found on the Clever App on your Office 365 account – click on “more apps” then on the FEV Tutor app’s student dashboard, click “Book a Session.”
- Use the **XELLO** link on the Clever App in your Office 365 account and other resources in the Career Center and on the Career Center webpage of the St. Charles High School website to investigate possible career paths and possible college majors. Explore!



- Stay involved in clubs and community service activities. Being involved helps you develop good time management skills, builds your resume, and could lead to leadership positions!!!
- Keep in mind that some colleges require more than the minimum high school graduation requirements (math, foreign language). Continue to take the most challenging classes!!!



Junior:

- College, Military, and Apprenticeship presentations and lunchroom visits will be scheduled to help you explore your options after high school.
- Visit college websites and sign up for information sessions, tours, open houses, etc.
- Participate in **In-Person** and **Virtual College Fairs**. These fairs provide you the opportunity to learn more about the colleges, the programs they have to offer, how the application process works, and ask any questions you may have.
- Take advantage of college tours and information sessions to learn more about the school.
- Get to know your teachers well as your academic teachers will need to give you letters of recommendation for college admissions, scholarship applications, and job applications.
- There are many books available containing sample college application essays and information about writing the college application essay. College Board also has information on their website, go to: <https://bigfuture.collegeboard.org/plan-for-college/your-college-application/write-your-essay>
- Thinking about enlisting in the military? The county has scheduled an **ASVAB** test to be administered on Saturday, November 19. Look in your StudentVUE for an email about how to register for it. **Deadline to register is Tuesday, November 8th.**
- Get/Stay involved in clubs and community service activities. Being involved helps you develop good time management skills, builds your resume, and could lead to leadership positions!!! Most college and scholarship applications ask about extracurricular activities, volunteer/community service, and leadership positions!!!
- Keep your grades up and use your resources such as Study Island, XELLO, Khan Academy, College Board (SAT) website, and ACT website to practice for college entrance exams. Resources are also available in the Career Center!
- Keep in mind that some colleges require more than the minimum high school graduation requirements (math, foreign language). Continue to take the most challenging classes!!!
- It is recommended that Juniors plan to take their **FIRST** SAT and/or ACT no later than the end of their junior year. Start thinking about when you will take these tests!!!

Senior:

- Filling out College Applications???? Here is **SCHS CEEB Code – 211067**
- College-bound seniors need to **File Your FAFSA Form for Academic Year 2023-2024 (the year you will be in college)**. Complete your FAFSA as early as possible!!
The FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) OPENED October 1!!! If you need help completing your FAFSA, go to: <https://studentaid.gov/apply-for-aid/fafsa/filling-out>. If you are ready to complete your FAFSA, go to: <https://studentaid.gov/h/apply-for-aid/fafsa>
- Some colleges are TEST OPTIONAL meaning they don't require SAT/ACT scores for their college application. **HOWEVER**, check to see if there is a GPA requirement to apply test optional and if SAT/ACT test scores are required in order to be considered for scholarships. **YOU DO NOT WANT TO MISS OUT ON FREE \$\$\$!!!**
- If you are a four-year college bound student, make sure you check on every college's website where you plan to apply to see what documents and/or test scores they require to have a **COMPLETE** application.



- Visit college websites and sign up for information sessions, tours, open houses, etc. This is a great way to help you decide which college is the RIGHT FIT for YOU!!!
- Participate in **In-Person** and **Virtual College Fairs** that are available. These fairs provide you the opportunity to learn more about the colleges, the programs they have to offer, how the application process works, and ask any questions you may have.
- **DON'T MISS DEADLINES!!!** Save copies of your applications and complete any college entrance exam testing your college is requesting.
- Look on college websites for separate applications to apply for scholarships and grants. It will be beneficial to you to complete your college applications by Thanksgiving so you can focus on your course work to keep a strong GPA—**SENIOR YEAR COUNTS TOO!**
- Be sure to send your test scores directly from the testing agency to your colleges, scholarship programs, NCAA, or tech schools.
- College, Military, and Apprenticeship presentations and lunchroom visits will be scheduled to help you to continue to explore your options after high school.
- Thinking about enlisting in the military? The county has scheduled an ASVAB test to be administered on Saturday, November 19. Look in your StudentVUE for an email about how to register for it.
- Thinking about an Apprenticeship? Apprenticeship applications are starting to OPEN and are opened for a limited time. Stop by the Career Center to pick up information!!!
- Be sure to take advantage of resources in the Career Center and on the Career Center webpage of the SCHS website to help you complete college applications, including application essays, and apply for scholarships. Keep working!
- Did you know there is a **List of Scholarships** and **Scholarship Search Engines** on the Career Center page of the St. Charles High School website??? Don't miss out on ALL these opportunities for FREE \$\$\$!!!

WRITING A COLLEGE ESSAY

Writing a College Essay



With a number of schools going test-optional for admissions, the essay becomes an even more important factor. Take time to write a strong, well-thought essay. It should be proofread and revised at least twice!!!

➤ **Do some self-exploration.**

Your college essay is all about showcasing yourself. Think about which of your strengths and interests you would most like colleges to know about you. What are you passionate about? What's most important to you? What are you best at?

➤ **If you need to pick the topic, be focused and specific.**

Writing about a single experience is usually a good idea: Your essay should prove a single point or message. Try to avoid cliché topics like "winning a big game" or "taking a trip" – these may not help your application stand out from the group.

➤ **Show your thoughtfulness.**

Be thoughtful in both your topic choice and the tone of your writing. Colleges look for students who have dealt with adversity, have overcome challenges, and continue to grow from their experience. Admitting shortcomings is a sign of maturity and intelligence, so there is no need to portray yourself as a superhero – they will see through it.

➤ **Get started early.**

Self-exploration can be fun, but don't procrastinate on the actual writing. You don't want to rush or be up against a tight deadline; it will affect your work.

➤ **Create an essay outline.**

Sometimes creating an outline for your essay can help you get started. It will also help you organize your thoughts and develop a framework.

➤ **Read the instructions and follow them.**

Be conscious of any length limits, and – if the topic is provided for you – analyze the question carefully. You want to be aware of everything they ask and answer everything thoroughly.

➤ **Use your own voice.**

Don't use big words just for the sake of using big words. They can distract from the essay when misused. Remember, this essay is about you – so use words you would use.

➤ **Use quotations and examples to show personal detail.**

Instead of just stating your point of view, you want to make your reader feel the experience. Adding detail will help convey your stance. However, don't use quotations simply to use them; make sure they make sense.



➤ **Try to be concise.**

While adding personal detail is good, you don't want to be wordy or long-winded; short sentences can be more powerful.

➤ **Don't use slang words.**

Generally speaking, slang words conjure the feeling of someone being unpolished, uncaring or not that serious. These are three things you don't want your admissions reader thinking about you. Likewise, avoid clichés and overuse of contractions.

➤ **Be honest.**

The point of this essay is to show who you are, not who you wish you were. Stick to what you know, and your true personality will shine through.

➤ **Don't be afraid to use humor if it's part of who you are.**

Admissions officers can have a sense of humor too, and, when used appropriately, humor can make you stand out. However, don't make being funny one of your top goals in your college essay.

➤ **Step away from your essay and come back later.**

Sometimes it helps to take a break from your work and come back in a few days. Review what you've written and make sure it still makes sense and conveys what you want it to.

➤ **Write multiple drafts.**

Sometimes you need to write a couple of drafts to get your essay right where you want it.

➤ **Type your essay.**

Sometimes you may need to mail your essays in separately. No matter how good your essay, if people can't read your handwriting, they won't appreciate the work. So, if possible, always try and type your essay.

➤ **Proofread your essay.**

You want to make sure you've used proper spelling, grammar, and punctuation, so ask an expert (such as your English teacher) to proofread your essay.

➤ **Get feedback from others.**

Ask your friends and family to read your essay and tell you what they think. Be open to suggestions and ways to improve it, even if this means going back to the drawing board.

➤ **Revise if necessary.**

You want to edit your essay down to what is important. Make every word count. There are many resources available with sample college application essays and information about writing the college application essay. When should you take the SAT or ACT?

Most students take the SAT or ACT for the FIRST time in the spring of junior year. Students who choose to take the SAT or ACT a second time typically do so in the summer or fall of senior year.

How do I know which test to take: SAT or ACT?

There really is not a straightforward answer to this question. The best way to decide is to take a timed full-length practice test of each. A few general differences are that the ACT has more geometry and trigonometry, ACT has sections where you cannot use a calculator, SAT provides more time per question, SAT provides some diagram of math formulas, and ACT has a science section testing your critical thinking skills (not your specific science knowledge). There is no longer a penalty for getting questions wrong on SAT. The old adage of if you do better in English take the ACT and if you do better in Math take SAT is not true for every student. Again, take a full-length practice test of each to see which test is best for you. Full-length practice tests are available on the **College Board website (SAT)**

Transcript Policy

Students have several options regarding transcripts.

- Each senior will be given one free unofficial transcript in the beginning of his or her senior year.
- Hard copies of transcripts cost \$2.00.
- Transcripts for scholarships are free.
- Transcripts are free for students who qualify for Free or Reduced Lunch.
- Transcripts sent electronically are free.
- All seniors will receive a free official final transcript mailed to the school/employer/etc. of their choice after they graduate.
- All seniors will have a free unofficial copy, included in their high school diploma envelope at the end of the year.
- A Transcript Request Form must be completed for each transcript and payment must be made at the time of the request. The forms are available in the Career Center, Counseling Office or on the St. Charles High School website.



Seniors must give the Counseling Office a minimum of five school days to complete their transcript requests unless extensive additional paperwork is required.

All transcript requests and other related forms should be turned in to the Counseling Office.

Coast Guard Missions

The Coast Guard does not fall under the Department of Defense. Until recently, the Coast Guard was under the Department of Transportation. Recent legislation has moved the Coast Guard to the Department of Homeland Defense. However, the Coast Guard is considered a military service, because, during times of war or conflict, the President of the United States can transfer any or all assets of the Coast Guard to the Department of the Navy. In fact, this has been done in almost every single conflict that in which the United States has been involved. The Coast Guard is commanded by a four-star admiral, known as the Coast Guard Commandant.



The Coast Guard is the nation's oldest continuous seagoing service with responsibilities including Search and Rescue (SAR), Maritime Law Enforcement (MLE), Aids to Navigation (ATON), Ice Breaking, Environmental Protection, Port Security and Military Readiness. In order to accomplish these missions, the Coast Guard has 43,000 active-duty men and women, more than 8,000 Reservists, and 30,000 Auxiliary personnel who serve in a variety of job fields, ranging from operation specialists and small-boat operators and maintenance specialists to electronic technicians and aviation mechanics. The Coast Guard, during an average day, will:

- Conduct 109 search and rescue cases
- Save 10 lives and assist 192 people in distress
- Protect \$2,791,841 in property
- Launch 396 small boat missions
- Launch 164 aircraft missions, logging 324 hours
- Board 144 vessels
- Seize 169 pounds of marijuana and 306 pounds of cocaine worth \$9,589,000
- Intercept 14 illegal migrants
- Board 100 large vessels for port safety checks
- Respond to 20 oil or hazardous chemical spills totaling 2,800 gallons
- Service 135 aids to navigation

Registering with Selective Service –



Attention all 17 and 18 year old male students: If you are not registered with Selective Service, you must do so within 30 days of turning 18. You MUST register. This is not a school requirement, it's the law. If you fail to register, it will affect your ability to receive Federal college loans, grants and student aid. How to Receive an Appointment to a Military Academy:

Applicants to all service academies, **except** for the United States Coast Guard Academy, must obtain a nomination to the school either through a **Senator or Representative**, the **Vice President**, or the **President**. Applicants to the Coast Guard Academy compete in a nationwide competitive process for nominations. Applicants are encouraged to seek nominations from ALL nominating sources.

Juniors & Seniors - If you are **planning to ENLIST in the MILITARY**, you **MUST** take the ASVAB. If you missed signing up for the FALL ASVAB offered at SCHS, you can sign up for the ASVAB test session the Charles County Public Schools Career and Technical Department is sponsoring on **Saturday, November 19, 2022, at Maurice J. McDonough High School at 9:00 am**. The ASVAB test is a series of short subtests that is designed to help students identify their skills in a variety of areas. The results of the test may be able to assist students in determining their career path after high school. To be eligible to participate in the November 19th test session, students must be at least 16 years old, and a current 11th or 12th grade CCPS student. Interested students can use the link below to register. Additional test site information will be sent (via Synergy) after registration closes. DEADLINE to sign up is Tuesday, November 8th. **PLEASE NOTE:** Students who took the ASVAB at SCHS on Monday, October 31, 2022, **CANNOT** take the November 19th ASVAB test – THERE MUST BE 30 DAYS BETWEEN YOUR TESTING DATES.
